

# Our Programs

## Building Connections



For grades K-5, this four-session program helps students develop a positive sense of self-worth and learn to value differences among people, diminishing prejudiced behavior. Building Connections helps children develop the skills needed to resolve conflicts and create an inclusive atmosphere.

## Camp Everytown

Four-day residential retreat through which high school students, faculty and other community members learn to value one another by breaking down the barriers of race, culture, gender, sexual orientation, ethnicity, religion and other sources of division. Camp Everytown builds awareness of prejudice, appreciation for diversity and new leadership skills.



## Common Ground

A week-long daytime program for incoming high school freshman designed to combat underlying causes of dropping out. We help students establish personal and positive connections within their school community before their first day of high school.

## Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Writing, Art and Writing Contest

Youth empowerment program designed to keep Dr. King's lessons alive for new generations of high school students. Using a theme from Dr. King's own words, the contest focuses students' creativity toward interpreting those words for their generation.

## Extremes of Hate: Holocaust Studies & Critical Thinking

A classroom-based exploration of the Holocaust, genocide and human rights, for high school and college students. Students participate in a customized, intensive, interactive program which includes multimedia presentations and Holocaust survivors who speak about their experiences.

## Interfaith Dialogue

Builds bridges among the many religious communities of Silicon Valley and prepares them to act together to speak out against discrimination and promote understanding and cooperation.

## Leadership Today

Based on the Camp Everytown program, Leadership Today is designed for young adult college students. Leadership Today delivers life-changing experiences through breaking down the barriers of race, culture, gender, sexual orientation, ethnicity, religion and other sources of division.

## Victim Witness Assistance

The Victim Witness Assistance Program strives to reduce the trauma of a violent crime by empowering and assisting crime victims, witnesses and significant others in reconstructing their lives. We accomplish this by providing advocacy, support and referrals.

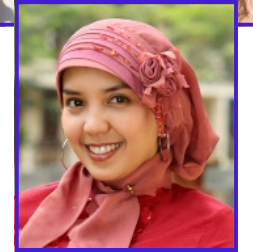

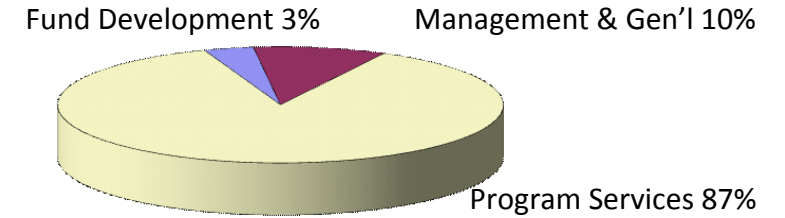

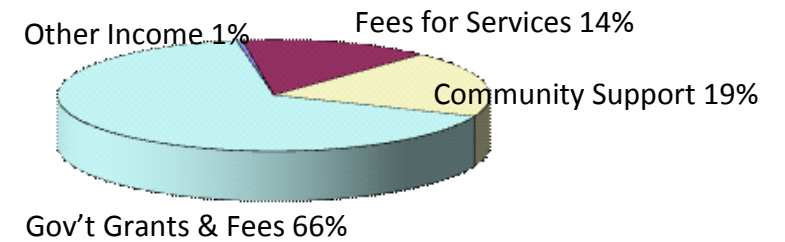
